Medical Tourism

Your flight lands at your tropical destination, and, being excited, you immediately run outside to smell the lovely, clean air and view the beautiful blue sky. Taking it all in, you inhale deeply, relax, appreciate the beauty and to then grab a taxi and head to the nearest hospital! Did you have an accident? Did the food on the airplane make you sick? Nope! You're a "medical tourist." You have been planning this trip for a long time, and now you have arrived at your destination to take advantage of high quality, low cost medical care and a little relaxation on the beach

Why would anyone fly half way around the world to get medical treatment they could just get at home? Money! The cost of surgery in Western Europe and the United States is often 10 times the price of what it is in Thailand, India or booth Africa, the leading medical tourist destinations. For example, a heart valve teplacement in the US will cost you at least \$200,000, but in India the same procedure is performed for only \$10,000. And in the US, if you have any complications and need to spend extra time in the hospital, you will pay a hefty price. In Thailand, on the other hand, if you need to spend a few days in a resort on the beach while recovering, it will cost you nothing; it's included in the cost of the surgery. With savings and service like that, it's no wonder that this strange but very practical type of tourism is becoming so popular.

However, the holiday season such as Seollal or Chuseok also brings many emotional and physical challenges for people like Sangmi. Several times a year, she suffers from various symptoms such as headache, fatigue and insomnia. It started when she married a man from a big, extended family. As the eldest daughter-in-law, she is expected to prepare the ancestral ritual at least 8 times a year. Her husband has 5 siblings, so it's not unusual to have 20 people to attend the ritual. To celebrate the major holidays, they arrive a day before and spend the night. As a hostess, she prepares accommodation and meals for them. Her sisters-in-law help her, of course, but she is the one who is in charge of all the work as perfect as it can be. With all this hard work, it is often the case that she can't even grab a bite until the ritual is over. She and her sisters-in-laws are stuck in the kitchen to cook and wash the dishes while men in the family enjoy the dishes. For Sangmi and other married women, born and grown up in a modernized nuclear family, traditional holidays come as a huge source of stress. This phenomenon has been coined as Holiday Syndrome, or Holiday depression, referring to a combination of symptoms many married women display before upcoming holidays.
